



# LIFE AT THE SHOP DURING A PANDEMIC

Guess what? Majority of the MW volunteers are in the high risk group susceptible to the effects of COVID-19. So March 15, we shuttered the shop from active assembly work. However we had individual parts makers that wanted to keep making their special parts. And we did limited access to the shop, cleaned tools better, wiped down common used areas and wore masks in close encounter situations.

To keep the parts materials flowing, we still expended funds to buy steel and wood. Since some workers always worked from home anyway, they had more time to work. Knowing that we were not assembling meant that our parts inventory is growing which is all for the good.

On May 1, City of Columbia lessened the restrictions. So the shop opened for assembly, and we offered the assembly teams to come in and build carts IF comfortable. We made 14 large Mobility Carts the first week back. While all of the existing shop is slowly becoming normal, the new shop did not miss a beat. Work progressed well towards a moving in date of mid-June.

All these activities require donations hence the generous offer of matching funds from two donors. As our donor base sat at home during Stay At Home orders, they had time to write checks. They contributed well and the Match was achieved.

The building fund is continuing to be replenished so that we will owe NOTHING, NADA, "0" when the new shop building is opened. By the way watch for a Grand Opening, Celebration, Ribbon Cutting day tentatively set for September 17 (and that is tentative at writing).

Our June fundraiser by the Rotaract Club has been moved to Sunday, August 30, again tentative date. Craft Beer and Carts has set a goal of 50 businesses and groups decorating 50 carts, meeting for a decorating contest and finally sending those carts to Kenya for a photo story back showing how mobility changed a life.

# 2020 CARES ACT CHANGES CHARITABLE DEDUCTIONS

The federal government has changed its rules for 2020 in how you can take an increase in charitable giving deductions. This special \$300 deduction per eligible taxpayer just happens to be the cost to build and ship a Mobility Cart. Check with your tax accountant.

#### SEC. 2104. ALLOWANCE OF PARTIAL ABOVE THE LINE DEDUCTION FOR CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS.

"(22) CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS.—In the case of taxable years beginning in 2020, the amount (not to exceed \$300) of qualified charitable contributions made by an eligible taxpayer during the taxable year.". (from Congress.gov)

### "THE GIRLS" DID IT AGAIN



# GRANTS FUND EQUIPMENT FOR NEW WORKSHOP


Thanks to a relatively mild winter, construction on the new Mel and Barbara West Cart Center, new home to Mobility Worldwide MO – Columbia, continues. "Despite the obstacles of the winter season and COVID-19, Coil Construction and the subcontractors have maintained their work schedule," Gary Moreau, Executive Director, noted. "The building is enclosed, parking lot poured, and all of the framing is in place. It has been exciting to watch." Workers are completing the interior work, with mid-June slated for the turnover. A team is now working details to facilitate a move shortly afterwards.

Outfitting the workshop is being made possible thanks to generous donations. The Stafford Family Charitable Trust funded equipment in the new welding shop. The Boone Electric Community Trust graciously funded the fire and security system. The PET Mobility Project Foundation provided for installation of new storage racks throughout the new facility.

Multiple donors have agreed to support landscaping costs. Moreau and a team of volunteers have completed plans for landscaping to be done this summer, with a focus on eco-friendly trees and grasses.

A grand opening celebration is slated for a tentative date of September 17.

# MOUNT KENYA UNIVERSITY STUDIES CARTS (continued from page 6)

(Compared to crawling or other devices)... All these modes of movement are very slow and not user friendly in comparison to the Mobility Carts. The carts are fast, easy to operate, can be used to carry the merchandise for selling and are more dignified.

.... After the Mobility Carts, 50% are now able to attend school with ease (school-going age)....

### Do you think the Mobility Cart changed the way the society looks at you? (98% said YES)

.... The respondents expressed their new experiences using the following sentences: "I have more friends. The church built a ramp so that disabled individuals can access the church. I am no longer viewed as needy. I have been appointed in my village Water Management Board.....

(96% did not have economic activity before the cart).. there was increased independence, 20 (69%) over the age of 20 years started economic activities...

From the above findings, it is apparent that the Mobility Carts have brought a transformation in the lives of many that were initially incapable of not only making an income but most importantly did not have the freedom to move...."

## MOUNT KENYA UNIVERSITY STUDIES CARTS (continued from spring issue)

### A STUDY FOCUSED ON "THE PSYCHO-SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC IMPACT OF MOBILITY CARTS".

"....As of September 2019 Partners for Care (constituted in 2012) in conjunction with partners like counties, foundations, corporates, disabilities groups, and individuals have donated 2659 Mobility Carts (wheelchairs) in Kenya to meet the goal. Each Mobility Cart is handcrafted by teams of skilled volunteers working at Mobility Worldwide locations throughout the United States.... Out of the 44 respondents, 15(34.1%) were aged 20 and below, 11(25%) were between 21-30, 8 (18.2%) were between 31- 40, 5 (11.4%) were between 41-50 and 5 (11.4%) were above 51....

Among the respondents, 26 (59.1%) were male, while 18 (40.9%) were female. In the African culture, the males are expected to fend for their female partners. "Not being able to provide for my family made me feel less of a man," this was the general sentiment by the male respondents.... The arrival of Mobility Carts alleviated some of these frustrations. (sell sweets and other merchandise, feel more useful, gained some confidence)....The female respondents.... they could respond to their crying babies, bring food to the table, and contribute to their families' welfare. They appreciated that they could experience some freedom to privately attend to their natural womanhood needs without always having to expose their private affairs to someone.
